For the second time **Lorraine Schutz** has taken a **World Time Trial Title** when coming first at St Johann, Austria, in the

55-59 year age division. She also finished 10th in the road race.

Michael Guerin also performed well, averaging over 39km per hour in the over 75yr Div. TT but only finishing 9th after facing an unfortunate penalty for a late start. He was 28th in the road race.

Also performing meritoriously in the TT & RR were Tracey Ober 8th and 9th respectively; Fred Landon, 22nd in the RR; Attila Nagy 5th in the RR, and Graeme Muston 76th out of 92 finishers after having crashed with a couple of km to go in the RR.

Race Results

10 August, Mt Helena, Gr. Scratch

It was all go at the Mt Helena Tavern as we mixed with bikies on vintage machines, a local wedding in the Tavern grounds and a large birthday party – it was probably the largest gathering ever seen in the village. Swelling the numbers were 51 of our stalwart members among whom were 16 ‘A’ graders, a dozen ‘C’ graders, 10 ‘D’ graders, and surprisingly only 13 in ‘B’ grade, where we usually attract over 20 riders. The day saw sunny skies and fresh to cool conditions, with a fair breeze against the riders on the home run.

The fate of ‘A’ grade was determined on the first lap when Paul Lamond, Chris Glasby and George Miller gave it the gun on the rise leading past the Toodyay Primary School, that saw them with a lead of about 30 seconds at the line. With two to go, four others bridged the gap and had shifted to an unassailable lead that was held to the end of the race. In an agonising uphill sprint Dean Gathercole had the strength to hold off George Miller, Andrew Brierley, Gary Wright and the rest of the seven-strong group. A large gap of four minutes divided them from the survivors. ‘B’ grade saw a quieter race than the premier grade, although there were attacks on the back part of the course that saw damage done to some. After knocking at the door for quite a while, Matt Wilding pulled off his first win, leading in Danny

Kelsall, Dave Equid, Mark Edele and the crocodile of riders that followed him across the line. Luckiest rider of the day was Gavin Lawson who landed on the floor after his wheel fell out following trouble with his quick release. Glad to say, he sustained no damage and finished the race.

Reports from the field suggested that Paul Wighton caused a lot of pain in ‘C’ grade, though not enough to cause irreparable damage, for the race ended in a bunch sprint. Mark Burke kept up his recent excellent record by heading Peter Maxwell, Trevor Robson and Ron Master across the line in an eight-up sprint.

The ‘D’ graders covered the circuit in roughly the same time as they rode at the previous race on the Mt Helena circuit, with the verdict being determined in a seven-up dash to the line that was taken comfortably by Bevan Buirchall. Strongman, Len Hall was second, a couple of metres back, while Paul Crespi retained his record of being regularly placed on the circuit when relegating Roy Swift to fourth place.

16 August, Collie-Lowden Handicap

From the pen of the President:

It was a fine sunny day with over 50 Masters riders travelling from Perth metro, Peel, Bunbury and Collie to ride the 72 km handicap over the classic Collie course. The front markers were first to the Lowden turn and all the way to Mumballup, with Brian Kennedy taking both primes. First over Heartbreak Hill was Tracey Ober who took the Toti Bonser award. Meanwhile, Brian Buck was putting in the ride of his life, having left his mark mates early in the race, and in a solo effort he passed all front markers to ride up Collie's main street as a clear winner.

Also putting in a strong effort was Tracey Ober who finished in second place, ahead of her mark mate Richard Fear. Next to finish was a group of middle markers headed by Danny Kelsall, Stuart Jones, Bob Addy, Ken Harvey, Paul Wighton, Terry Skinner and Gavin Lawson. Front marker Larry Ross finished in 11th place when just holding off Nick Foster, Frans Buissink, Gary Collett and Ian Lyne. Scratch disintegrated early in the race but George Miller still managed to take fastest time in 1hr 51min 38 secs, just 14 seconds short of the race record.

With generous donations and sponsorships and a great atmosphere on the day, there were many happy faces. Thanks must go to Colin and Anne Rossiter, Stan Fennell, Alan Clark, Graeme Benthien and Raelene Ridley for their special efforts, which helped make the day such a success.

24 August, Group Scratch, Wandii

An almost perfect day with a light breeze and cloudy but pleasant conditions attracted a good turnout of 63 riders. 'B' grade again saw the largest field with 23 riders but apart from a couple of attempts by Steve Dodd there were no apparent efforts made for breaks to appear, thus leading to a large bunch sprint that saw it necessary to engage the camera to sort out the placings. Not having raced for a while and being burned off in his last two appearances, Paul Brown still had the nous and the strength to hit when it really mattered and just beat another 'ace' Chris Brown across the line in the mass sprint. Mark Paget was a close third, just a few centimetres ahead of Omar de Pellegrin, while Ian McFall, Danny Kelsall and Brett Clapham were lined up close behind to take the remainder of the prizes.

'A' grade had a different tale to tell, as Andrew Brierley decided to shun his compatriots by blasting off from the word 'go' to ride away from the bunch until Eddy Hollands decided to join him half-way through the race. The pair soon extended Andrew's 90 seconds lead and by the finish they were over 4mins ahead of the bunch. Eddy being the fresher of the two, took the sprint ahead of Andrew, while George Miller battled up the rise to finish in third place at the head of the chasing group. Gary Collett was a length or two behind, followed in 5th and 6th place by Chris Glasby and Nick Smith. The average lap time for the 83km being 12 minutes, perhaps illustrates the quality of the rides by Eddy and Andrew. During the race, the referee put his words into action when he disqualified one rider for crossing

the white line and riding on the wrong side of the road without being forced by circumstances to do so.

The eleven riders in 'C' grade appeared to have an uneventful ride until the very end of the race. Unfortunately they'd just been passed by 'B' grade but in the drive to the line the 'C' grade bunch passed them on the right side of the road. No drama here, and 'B' did well to keep to the left, except that at that moment a Ute decided to ignore the warning signs and only pulled in at the last moment. Fortunately there were no problems and Mark Burke took the sprint comfortably from Bob Stephens, Chris Hunt, Paul Wighton and the rest of the field.

'D' grade was enlivened by the presence of Debbie Visentin, who, it was claimed, livened up the pace, especially in the latter half of the race. This probably accounted for the wheezing that was evident after the finish, and Debbie was rewarded with a second place a length or so behind the strongly finishing Len Hall. Larry Ross was also in sprinting form when taking third place just ahead of Derek Mayall.

It was good to see three fresh female faces on the day, all three finishing comfortably along with their respective bunches Sarah Fraser in 'B'; Sue Johnston in 'C' and Debbie Visentin in 'D'.

31 August Pickering Brook Gr. Scratch

There was hardly a breath of wind for the 47 starters on the undulating Pickering Brook circuit and the chilly conditions at the start of the race did nothing to stop the 'A' graders from getting into a good sweat as the record time for the course was shattered on the first full circuit with a time of 11mins 55 secs. That was cut by an additional 5 secs on the 7th lap, while only a couple of laps went over the 12m 0secs mark. A break of three, Ray Gillespie, Gary Wright Chris Glasby set the standard when breaking away on the 2nd circuit. They continued to draw slowly ahead but with three of the 10 laps to go they were joined by Eddy Holland who put in a terrific effort to get on. Behind the break, George Miller, Andrew Brierley and Marty Van Moorsel made a valiant effort to bridge the gap but were weakened with two to go when Marty decided the pace was too hot. Because of the fast pace, the 'scientific' calculations were somewhat sabotaged, so that the finish was shared with 'B' grade. However, as the riders came up to the line with daylight between riders, it was easy to separate the finishers. Roy Gillespie put in a great effort to take the 'A' race, while Gary Wright, Eddy

Hollands and Chris Glasby filled the next three places. George Miller led in Andrew Brierley some 15 seconds down, while the rest of the field finished some two minutes behind.

'B' grade seemed to move comfortably together for the duration of the race, though Wayne Hartas and Mark Edele decided to call it a day before the bell lap when complaining of aching thighs. There was a close contest in the sprint with Matthew Wilding taking the first place just ahead of Russell Fulton, Matt Davis and Steve Bush. Ian Lyne found it more comfortable in the grade than he had in 'A' over the last few events and was happy to finish 5th in the bunch a half-a-length in front of Ian McFall.

'C' grade were strengthened with the inclusion of regular 'B' graders Geoff Marshall and Wayne Lally, though neither of these riders dominated the proceedings. However, on the final lap, Paul Wighton continued his good run when he flew up the hill on Repatriation Road and finished some 20 seconds ahead of his compatriots. Geoff Marshall took the bunch sprint but only after a last second jump that took him just ahead of Mark Burke, Jeff Usher, Trevor Robson and the rest of the bunch.

'D' grade saw the only puncture victim of the day, causing Dave Nangle to pull out half-way through the race. Barrie Eversden in his first race for months found the going too hard, while Kevan Logan who faced too few training miles kept plugging away to finish almost a lap down. All bets at the line were on Len Hall, the strong man of the bunch but the verdict went instead to Rod Babel in a rare appearance, who more than likely had been putting in lots of mountain biking miles. Rod beat Len by a good length, while Roy Swift kept up his recent series of placings when just heading Paul Crespi and the other finishers

*15 September, Peel CC Classic Handicap,
84km Casuarina*

In what turned out to be one of the hardest days for quite a while, some 36 riders faced the flat but windswept 15.8km circuit. Apart from the four riders who called in sick, it was disappointing to note that 11 others didn't turn up – a situation that weakened some groups as well as upsetting the organizers who had put up a prize-list of over \$1,600. Hopefully those who didn't turn up will do the honourable thing by sending their nomination money to the club.

The other disappointment occurred when the seven riders in the 12m 30s group took a short cut after ignoring the line instructions to turn only at those corners where there were marshals. The result was the elimination of the group, though some of the hardier members then decided to ride out the race as a training run. The rest of the event was one of attrition, with some groups breaking up after two of the five laps, leaving riders to be picked up and dropped by faster bunches. In particular a

vicious side-wind in the 2nd half of the course played havoc. Scratch, down to four starters made no ground on the 1m 30 secs group who also started four-strong, and after the 2nd lap they even lost ground. However, at the beginning of the final lap it was obvious that the smooth riding trio of Lee Parker, Russell Fulton and Ian Lyne from the 5 min group would be impossible to beat – and at the end of the day they came home 2m 12secs ahead of the 1m 30sec riders led in by Graeme Muston who took the fastest time prize in the same time as Steve Marks and Brian Farrelly. Limit riders were not without their glory and with a \$25 prime up for grabs at the end of the first 4 laps, Brian Kennedy took 3, the other being taken by Lee Parker at the end of lap four. Kevan Logan slipped back from his limit group to back of the field after finding the conditions a bit tough following his lay-off, but doggedly plugged away to be the only rider from the 28-minute group to finish. Perhaps illustrating the toughness of the day were the 19 non-finishers and the winner's time of 2h 12m 20secs, some 12 minutes slower than the record for the event (though on a slightly different and slightly shorter course).

Because of various rumours surrounding his medical condition, Colin Rossiter has requested that the following message be posted to our members:

“At the end of June I was diagnosed with cancer of the oesophagus. The diagnosis was a shock to say the least! I have

consulted with five specialists, none of who had any good news. Biopsies confirmed that this rare, aggressive tumour had already spread to the lymph glands and surgery was not an option. Four weeks ago my oncologist told me if I did nothing I had approximately three months to live. Consequently I started chemotherapy. The regime is five days of two different chemo drugs running for 120 hours straight. They plan to combine the chemo with radiation in the near future. On the positive side, I have still been able to go for rides, mow the lawn, etc.

P.S. With chemo remission possible, maybe one or two years – who knows! Planning a comeback – so watch out!
