#### **RACE RESULTS**

#### 19 August - Graded Scratch - Chidlow 'B'

A glorious springlike day, some hard fought races, and grand scenery for those of the 84 starters who were dropped on this relatively hilly circuit. But surprising was the small time difference per lap between the top grades, with 'A' grade moving on average at 15 seconds per lap faster then 'B'.

'A' grade with its 20 starters saw action from the word go as George Miller, Greg Stoyles and Chris Glasby opened up a gap of 20 seconds at the end of the first 17.6km circuit. This increased by another 10 seconds at the end of lap two, and was further extended on lap three to one minute. This saw a reaction from the bunch, so that two surviving escapees, George Miller and Chris Glasby, had their lead halved as they entered the final lap. Some 5 or 6km later, both were absorbed by the bunch, though George managed to hold on to feature in the prize list. Sam Smith attacked on the final hill and then rode comfortably to free wheel across the line some 10 to 15 seconds ahead of 2<sup>nd</sup> placed rider Doug Stewart, with Gary Wright and Adrian White finishing another couple of lengths behind. George Miller was rewarded with 5<sup>th</sup> place, while Paul Hearne was 6<sup>th</sup> just ahead of a group led in by Peter Hammond. Peter Shanley was out of luck when suffering a puncture, the only one other than Jaimie Kirkwood in Div. 'B', and Roy Swift in 'E' to suffer from this problem on the day.

'B' grade had the largest division with 28 riders. Trial rider Ben Marsden was an early aggressor who led the field by a handful of seconds over the first two laps. Caught on the third, he was gain in contention when he broke away with Ian Turner to command a lead that was, however, slowly dragged back as they approached the finish line. With only 300 metres to go, the duo's lead came to nought as the eager peleton put in a final effort to bring them back to the fold. An impressive sprint saw an 'easing' Thomas Walsh take the laurels to finish a couple of lengths ahead of Mark Waite, who, in turn led in oldest man in the grade, Bob Addy. Ian Turner was rewarded with his prize-money for 4<sup>th</sup> place, while Mike Burton and Ian McFall were next over the line in a tightly bunched finish following fireworks on the last 200m that saw at least one rider end up with his wheels in the dirt.

'C' grade had a respectable field of 22 riders. The group moved smoothly together as they passed the judges on each of their three laps of the circuit, though heroics might well have been played out elsewhere on the course! When it came to the finish, it was Chris Barker who once again sprinted impressively to beat Jeff Gleadow and Richard Whittaker over the line. Leading the 'Dutch' invasion when taking 4th, 5th and 6<sup>th</sup> palaces were, Bert Veenendaal, Hank Koelemij and Peter Neuzerling. Alison Dyson finished a respectable 10<sup>th</sup>, while the only other female rider, Emma Gillard also rode well to held her own in 17<sup>th</sup> place.

What has happened to 'D' grade? With relatively large fields up until recently, only 10 riders lined up for the event and with such a small group there were few if any meaningful attacks, resulting in another bunch sprint to finish off the day's work. In a fast finish, Mick Brown crossed a length ahead of Bob Stephens, with Martin Van Voorthuizen another length behind.

While Doc Lawrance and Laurie Muccarione dropped back on the hills on the first of their two laps in 'E' grade, both were happy to finish the event – and Laurie was pleased to see himself improving his performance, so showing the benefits of perseverance over the season. With the loss of Roy Swift to the puncture bug this left three riders to fight out the finish. Derek Mayall impressed the spectating masses with a strong surge that carried him across the line two lengths ahead of flying Scotsman Dave Nangle, and Glynn Birds, the latter riding in his second come-back event. Let Roy be a glowing example to you all, as after his puncture he used his spare to continue his ride to finish the event. No doubt his training in younger days on the Yorkshire Moors and bleak wind-swept Pennines when not having a spare could prove fatal, explains his actions - but its always a good idea to be prepared.

#### 26 August – Graded Scratch – Neerabup

It was another perfect day for racing with hardly a breath of wind and blue skies for yet another 'century' of riders (in fact, 101). Perfect that is for all but those unfortunate to

be caught up in an accident during the final lap of 'C' grade's race, three of whom were carted off by ambulance to Joondalup hospital after suffering from broken bones. Bruce Abbott, Stephen Millford and Scott Lee were the unlucky ones, while they and others also suffered damage to frames and equipment. Thank you to our ever-alert riders in 'A' grade, especially Gary Wright and Mark Castle and others who sacrificed their racing to provide 1st Aid, and also thanks to our flying squad led by Alison Athertone, who were quickly on the scene with 1st Aid equipment. This put a dampener on the day, which until then had seen some excellent racing.

Conditions replicated the previous ride on the circuit, as the overall lap averages were within 10 seconds for 'B', 'C' and 'D' grades, while 'A' and 'E' were exactly the same. 'A' grade, with 32 starters was again the largest of the day, that event seeing the most action on the day. A daring attack on the 2<sup>nd</sup> lap involving Paul Prottey, Ian Gregory, Phil Johnston and George Miller saw them stay ahead of the field by 20 seconds on the next lap, a lead that increased steadily to 65 seconds at the bell, George was heard cursing his compatriots to maintain the effort but though they slowed down when foxing for positions on the last lap they still crossed the line with a lead of 40 seconds. In the sprint, George put in a last gasping effort that saw him with a three-length win over Paul Prottey, Ian Gregory and Phil Johnston, while Andrew Brierley led in the chasing bunch just ahead of Troy Coulthard. Ian Lyne and Thomas Walsh fell foul of the puncture bug.

'B' grade rode at a fast and steady pace until two laps to go when Michael Johnston passed the judges with a lead of 15 seconds, a lead that had increased to 25 seconds at the bell. Charlie Gargett managed to dislodge himself from the bunch to chase down the tiring Michael, and succeeded by catching him on the final runin to the line where he beat him by 5 metres. The bunch were another 10 seconds behind led in by a flying Ian McFall, Stephen Farran, Bob Addy, John Liso and the rest of the closely packed bunch.

Minus the three casualties and a few other comrades who had luckily fallen off the road into black sand [and what a fine sight they were!), 'C' grade saw a bunch finish in which Andrew Yeates took his first victory with a strong sprint in which David Ellis and Chris Barker again showed form when finishing 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> respectively. Simon Neaves, Richard Whitaker Bert Veenendaal and Mick Russell took out he remainder of the money prizes.

'D' grade, as is normal, kept together for the majority of the race and the finishing order produced no surprises except for the 3<sup>rd</sup> place of Glynn Birds who was riding his third race with the club, and having been promoted on the day from 'E'. However, not a great surprise to old-timers who recognised Glynn as a very capable rider from the distant past. Bob Stephens took line honours over Jon Dooner, while Alan MacDonald finished 4<sup>th</sup> just ahead of Denis Cosgrove who was making only his second or third ride of the season. Helen Cripps was dropped half-way through the event but doggedly kept on to the bitter end to record a finish.

'E' grade saw an expected pattern when Roy Swift, Dave Nangle and Derek Mayall moved off the front where they remained until the run in to the line. Roy took out yet another victory ahead of Dave and Derek, while Megan McEwan who is on the comeback trail finished fourth. Hats off to Denis Robinson and Laurie Muccarione for their solo efforts to finish the event.

#### 9 September - Graded Scratch - Wandi.

A large field of 136 riders and fine conditions saw another successful day at the hustings. No great dramas except for the disqualification of the winner of 'A' grades sprint. The first gap appeared in that grade with four laps to go when Matt

Tognini and three compatriots opened up a 25-second lead. The next lap, three others joined the break, and with two laps to go 10 riders led the bunch by 50 seconds. That lead was extended to 1min 30secs at the bell, after which it was curtains for the riders in the main peleton. In a frantic sprint to the line it was Wayne Thomson who led out the escapees but after playing 'silly buggers' he was relegated to the back of the race. George Miller was subsequently promoted to first, followed by John Gregg, Greg Stoyles, Paul Prottey, Ian Gregory, Patrick Hayburn, Ian Lyne, Jeff Brooks, Paul Lamond and Mark Waite. Richard Kelly led in the main field or at least in the confusion that's what was recorded!

'B' grade saw a number of attempts to stretch the field, with Ian McFall showing some daylight between himself and the rest of the 30-strong bunch at the end of the first lap. It was then all together, the peleton seeming to take it easy, being well down on their schedule recorded on the previous ride on the course. With just over half the race over, Andy Candy took a slight lead and at the start of the final lap there was a small group that had pulled away to a 50seconds lead. In a close finish Stephen Farran eased out Dean Emslie by a quarter of a wheel, though in his excitement Dean committed the cardinal sin of throwing his hands in the air and as a result suffered with a hefty fine. Matt Davis showed his return to form when finishing third, to be closely followed by a camera-separating mob of Ian Turner, Gavin Wark, Tim Mollison, Matt Reid and Magnus Rudisele.

'C' grade moved at a smart but predictable pace throughout the race – no breaks were recorded despite there being 39 starters in the grade (possibly the largest 'C' bunch on record). The sprint finish produced no surprises but did provide food for thought for the handicapper, as the first few across the line had been prominent in other recent races. Chris Barker put his best wheel forward to win by a comfortable half-a-length over David Ellis, with Andrew Yeates in third. Jeff Gleadow again featured, being fourth, just ahead of Peter Neuzerling and first female rider home, Emma Gillard who was a length ahead of eighth placed Dave Equid.

'D' grade performed to schedule, finishing in exactly the same time as on the previous ride at Wandi, when averaging 14m 20secs per lap. This was done at a steady pace and riders should have been rewarded for keeping to the lap timetable kept by the timekeeper. Crossing the finishing line in first place was recent recruit Phil Devenish followed by old-timer Allan McDonald, while Roger Reeves, Mick Brown, Paul Greeney and Wayne Gordon finished in that order to fill the rest of the six cash prize slots.

The folk in 'E' grade were on a mission, and that was to break the course record. Up on schedule for three of the five laps there was a lull on the penultimate lap, and when Mick Dunne crossed the line in first place the grade had recorded the same lap average as their previous best time performance. Roy Swift was the second finisher a length or two behind Mick, while the Tartan Terror, Dave Nangle was third, just ahead of Derek Mayall. Denis Robinson, Megan MCEwan and Laurie Muccarrione all had lonely rides, but in the spirit of things they finished the race.

# 16 September – Willing Homes Age Division Championships – Chidlow 'A'.

Another glorious day – perfect conditions and only light traffic despite the Hills Footy finals being run a few hundred metres up the road. There were 95 entries, a few DNS's and also a few DNF's, thus illustrating competition was keen and that there were a few Battle Royals in the fight for the honours – however, because of the large number of divisions, a blowby-blow account would be tedious and would also possibly highlight the efforts of one champion over another.
