# **RACE RESULTS**

# 13 January: Total Travel, Supa Series, Criteriums, Kewdale.

What a turnout! And possibly attracted by Total Travel's sponsorship, a record 148 riders presented themselves to the starter, though unfortunately there were fewer who presented at the finish line. Apart from a few abandonees, a clash on the penultimate bend, as 'B' graders eagerly jostled for position, saw an ambulance called to attend to the fallen. Most unfortunate was Jarrod

Bell who having travelled all the way from Geraldton found himself for a day in a hospital bed after suffering concussion and a suspected broken collarbone. All best wishes go to Jarrod for a quick recovery. All 43 riders were together at the time of the accident, though there were a few earlier attacks. The first involved Lee Potthast and Ian Trayler who had opened up a lead of 150metres at the 10-minute mark, They were soon reeled in which gave a few minutes glory to Darren Hawley who was similarly brought back to the bunch. What looked like a serious split occurred after 25 minutes but the two halves came together again after two or three laps. Scott Ayles and Mark Hoyer were the last two to try to break up the peleton but again to no avail. Jaimie Kirkwood punctured with 2 laps to go when in a good position, but was not allowed to take a wheel because of the rule that states riders cannot take a lap out in the final two laps of a race. With half the bunch out of contention because of the crash, there was still a bunch of twenty or so who contested the sprint. This went to Ian McFall in scintillating style as he accelerated up the straight to hold a 5-metre lead at the line over Rob Martin, Garth O'Leary, Justin Capolicchio, Tim Mollison, Garry Suckling and a host of others.

'C' grade attracted 30 entrants though careful vetting by the majority saw little chance for would-be escapees. Possibly the only attack where a gap was evident – at least as witnessed on the finishing straight - was a short-lived attempt by Michael Watson and Patrick Walsh to distance themselves from their compatriots. In the sprint, familiar faces were evident as they came to the line, the first three places being taken by Joe Radisic, Robert Heinrich and Bob Addy. Peter Neuzerling was also in the reckoning in 4<sup>th</sup> place, followed closely by trial rider Ben Logan, Steve De Bono and Darren Schenk.

'D' grade saw a unique occurrence when Doug Macdonald on the second lap opened up a gap of 150metres, a lead that he held for another three laps until joined by Ian Broadley and Richard Barville. Doug, whose forte lies in the sprint should serve as a glorious example for all who believe that a sprinter's only place is on a wheel. However, the rest of the race showed no more surprises as everyone geared up for the final sprint. This was taken clearly

by Bruce Abbott who put a few lengths between himself and Doug Macdonald who had recovered well after his earlier effort. Another of the escapees, Richard Barville finished 3rd, followed by a rejuvenated Dave Bebee, Andrew Lowe and Zoltan Kalotas.

The 'E' graders were represented by a field of 13 riders – lucky for some, especially the ladies, for after a race run at a fair pace, Helen Cripps came out of the traps to trounce the field in an impressive sprint – her second such win in two weeks. Derek Mayall was best of the males, just beating the much-improved Laurie Muccarione into third place. Helen Peniston in 4<sup>th</sup> led in a bevy of other female rparticipants, Heather Sanderson, Andrea Smith and trial rider Sharon Sharman being respectively 5<sup>th</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup>.

Last but not least, the Premier grade this was exhausting to watch such was the pace. Carl Skinner and Jason Puls started the fireworks when they went from the gun, while on the 2nd lap Roger Knight, Patrick Hayburn and Pedro Turibaka opened up a lead of 100metres. That break was nullified following lap but the using psychological moment of capture, four riders got away - Ryan Suckling, Doug Stewart, Bradeley Hall and Ian Gregory. Working well together they continued to increase their advantage to 20 seconds from the peleton, but seeing the danger they were chased and joined by Hilton McMurdo and Carlo Barendilla on lap 5, while Eddie Hollands caught them at the 17minute mark. Andrew Patterson also made a valiant attempt but lay in no-man's-land for a number of laps before going back to the bunch which at the 35-minute mark was a good 30 seconds behind. The lead then quietly increased, being 55 second with three laps to go, at which juncture Hilton McMurdo and Carlo Barendilla decided to attack, a move that had some of the group struggling after a race that had averaged almost 44kph. Came the moment of truth and it was Carlo who proved victorious with Hilton a length-and-a half behind. Bradeley Hall was third while the rest came in in single file, Ryan Suckling being 4<sup>th</sup>, Eddie Hollands 5<sup>th</sup>, Doug Stewart 6th and Ian Gregory 7<sup>th</sup>. A minute later the bunch was led in by Pedro Turibaka, Paul Miller and Paul Foxwell. Unfortunately Carlo decided to take a trial ride, which removed him from the prize list – a decision that brought benefits to those prize-getters down the line who managed to shift up a place.

# 3 February: Cycle Buzz-Sidi Shoes – Supa Series Criteriums, Kewdale.

Another excellent day's racing for the 136 riders who turned up at Kewdale on a day of clear blue skies and temperatures reaching 33 degrees. With Jeff Appleton of Cycle Buzz providing sponsorship funds, those present were well rewarded in terms of the prize-money. Only one minor fall in 'D' grade that resulted in grazing, though there were a few complaints from 'A' grade that some fellow competitors cut across the field in the final run to the line. One popular innovation was the presence of a coffee

Van, with the promise that this will be present at future races.

With 40 and 39 riders respectively, 'A' and 'B' grades provided lots of shelter for those looking for an easy ride, though numerous attacks made this suggestion more of an illusion than a fact. As usual, it was 'A' grade that provided the most exciting entertainment, the first attack involving Paul Prottey, Paul Miller, Matt Tognini and Brett Stapelton going from the gun. They survived for a few laps before being brought back to the fold, though Paul Millar was also one of a trio consisting of Carl Skinner and Paul Foxwell that stayed away for about 15 minutes until the bunch swamped them at the 28-minute mark. Brett Stapelton was again in action alongside Greg Stoyles for a couple of laps of glory but the decisive move came at the 40-minute mark when Ryan Suckling and Ian Gregory got together to draw away from the peleton. With 2 laps to go they had moved to a lead of 55 seconds, a lead that had only been reduced by 5 seconds at the bell. Ryan put in a superb effort up the finishing straight, while Ian sat up in surrender with 30 metres to go. Meanwhile John O'Brien led in the bunch to cross the line just ahead of Scott Sanders, Paul Foxwell, Greg Bastion and a stretched out line of riders.

'B' grade also witnessed numerous attacks but not to the intensity seen in the premier grade. Gary Woodland returned to the WCMCC to prove his worth after an absence of a few years and rode off the front of the peleton on the 2<sup>nd</sup> lap along with Scott Ayles, while Kevin McIlduff tried a solo when they were brought back a lap or two later. Jeff Gleadow, Brett Clapham, Mick Russell and Russ Scott were next to go, and this was followed by a number of attempts to split up the field, though all came together for a period of calm after the 30-minute mark. The field then resigned itself to a mass sprint finish with the verdict going to Carl Poigndestre, ahead of Rob Martin, Robert Heinrich, Terry Andrews, Justin Capolicchio and Garth O'Leary, all of whom have featured among the place-getters in recent events.

'C' and 'D' grades found that the hot conditions made it sensible to stick together, though Mike Watson in 'C' opened up a gap early in his race, while Chris Whiley made a valiant effort when staying out front for two laps at the end of the race. 'C' grade saw the sprint go to Darren Schenk, with Karl Thorstensen and Ben Smith taking the first three places. 'D' grade saw victory go to Richard Barville, with Bruce Abbott a close 2<sup>nd</sup>, followed by the ever-present Bob Stephens and Jon Dooner.

The 'E' graders stayed together for much of the race, though Kevin Hart and Ken Wibberley took a slight lead for a lap early in the proceedings, while Helen Peniston made a bid for freedom at 15minutes that lasted for almost two laps. Derek Mayall bided his time and in a strong sprint led 2<sup>nd</sup> placed Heather Sanderson across the line by about four bike lengths. Denis Robinson was 3rd and Kevin Hart 4<sup>th</sup>.

# 10 February: KD Cycles – Trek Bicycles – Supa Series Criteriums Rockingham

Possibly the forecast of 42 degrees put off a number of riders for the races saw a fall in numbers from the highs of the previous weeks to 90 riders. However, the forecast was way off the mark and conditions were comfortable with temperatures in the low 30s but with a stiff breeze that should have discouraged lone heroics. Not that the racing was without incident, for Zoltan Kalotas fell while riding in 'D' grade and had to be carted off in an ambulance for observation (he's recuperating in Bali and says he'll be back in action when his aches and pains have gone!). The disruption saw a restart for the group and some delays for 'C' and 'A' grades. All worked out in the end and there was, as usual, some excellent racing.

The premier grade saw an unusual pattern with much of the event being dominated by two or three-up breakaways. Matt Tognini and Eddie Hollands set up the pattern when they opened up a 50 metre gap on lap 1, but were replaced on lap 2 by Chris Glasby and Deane Emslie who held a lead until lap 4 when Malcolm Miller, Hilton McMurdo, Matt Tognini and Paul Foxwell pulled away for a 40 metre lead. The rest of the race saw a promising break by Chris Glasby, Paul Foxwell, Andrew Brierley and Jeff Brooks who worked together to open up gaps that ranged from about 15 to 25 seconds. However, folk in the peleton were biding their time and brought them back from a 15 second lead with two to go, to about 10 seconds at the bell. The chase was over before the group hit the final corner, and in the sprint Eddie Hollands put in an effort that took him across the line some two or three lengths ahead of Hilton McMurdo, and Paul Dobson. Chris Glasby has enough left in the tank to take fourth place with Jonathon O'Brien and Andrew Brierley finishing close behind.

B' grade also saw its share of breakaways, though what was unusual was the role of Joe Radisic who featured out front for the first 13 laps. On lap one he was accompanied by Anthony Collis - rode alone for another 3 circuits, and was then joined by Tim Turner and Steve Rouse. Steve dropped back to the shelter of the peleton while the duo continued on being chased in turn by small groups of riders. Keeping a lead that ranged from 10 to 15seconds, all came together at about the 40-minute mark. Though there was then an attack by Ross Scott, Stewart Greenan, Tim Brett Clapham Mollison, and Neuzerling with three laps to go, it never exceeded a lead of more than 10 seconds. A number of chasers breached the gap on the final lap and in a strong showing, Ian McFall led in a fast moving line of riders to cross a bike length away from fellow Churchill cycles team members Andrew Duff. Ross Scott took a deserved third place after his hard work during the chase, to be **Brett** followed by Nathan Mitchell, Clapham and Bruce McLennan who took

the last of the seven placings that attracted prize-money.

'C' grade stayed largely together with only a couple or riders prepared or able to show their backsides to the bunch. Bob Addy tried at the 28minute mark but was quickly negated by the bunch, while Derek Robertson also rode away to a 70metre lead a lap later. However, it all came down to a close mass sprint, with the verdict going to Ben Smith followed closely by Darren Schenk, Ben Logan, Alan Graham, Mitch Law and Bob Addy.

Following the accident that caused disruption, as reported above, 'D' grade was restarted, with the race being reduced to 20 minutes and 2 laps from the original 30 minutes. However, the time-keeper was dreaming and with rumblings from the afflicted, the bell didn't ring until about 30 minutes, though it's doubtful whether this made any difference to the results in the final sprint. This saw a clear win by Kevin Beverley who improved on his previous week's 2<sup>nd</sup> place, while Richard Barville was second followed by Andrew Lowe, Bruce Abbott, Tracy Suckling and Bob Stephens. Three riders decided not to re-start, thus bringing the field down to 18 riders, while Glenn Pederson DNS'd because he had 'bloodied' his racing vest after using it to make the injured Zoltan Kalotas comfortable.

It wasn't expected in the earlier windy part of the day that there would be any serious attacks in 'E' grade. However, there were some anxious faces and frantic wheel hugging when Mick Dunne opened up a 40metre lead on the 3<sup>rd</sup> lap. A more sedate pace ensued, though the fight to the line was without quarter. Mick Dunne, renown for his sprint, was the winner by a couple of lengths over the much-improved Laurie Mucciarone, while Kevin Hart just squeezed by Heather Sanderson at the line. Derek Mayall appeared to have lost the fire of the previous week when he finished first, while Denis Robinson filled the 6<sup>th</sup> and final place.

Overall, a good day's racing despite the disruptions and the thoughtless action of a few 'C' grade riders who dawdled around the course after their finish, a move that baulked a few 'A'; graders as they swept around the final bend for their finish. Thanks again to KD Cycles –Trek Bicycles for sponsoring the event

and thanks to Kelly Gray and son for heir presence at the presentation.

# 17 February: KHT Chartered Accountants – Supa Series Criteriums, Kewdale

A day when 'B' grade with 46 riders saw the largest field for a single division in our collective memory, and a total field of 146 that was only two short of the record set on 13<sup>th</sup> January. The negative of the day was a fall by Greg Smith in 'C' grade that saw him carted off in an ambulance with injuries to his jaw – hopefully he'll make a quick recovery.

Surprise of the day was the ride by Ken Wibberley in 'E' grade. Ken who has been dropped in every event since starting racing early in the season, dropped the field on the final two laps and finished 2<sup>nd</sup> after being caught by Derek Mayall with about 15metres to the line. Good to see such an improvement which serves as incentive for all 'triers' in the ranks. Kevin Hart was 3<sup>rd</sup> after riding hard at the front of the bunch for much of the race, while Denis Robinson also showed signs of returning to form with a strong finish for 4<sup>th</sup> place.

'D' graders were attentive, giving little leeway for would-be escapees. There were a few attempts and Gerry Allen was conspicuous on a couple of occasions, once in the company of Tracy Suckling, while the newly returned Bevan Buirchell tried a solo but was soon brought back to the shelter of the pack. Bill Stibbs also put some space between himself and the peleton at about the 20minute mark. The finish saw a rush up the finishing straight but the man-in-black, Bruce Abbott, surged to the fore in the last 40metres to take a healthy victory over 2<sup>nd</sup> placed Andrew Lowe, with a rejuvenated Dave Bebee in 3rd leading in Geoff Gilmore, Richard Barville and Tracy Suckling.

'C' grade had 31 starters who set off at a fair pace led out by Corey Freeman and trial rider Anthony Banks, the pair having a 40metre lead as they passed the finish line on the first lap. They were closed down but at about the 10minute mark a promising split occurred that saw a saw a large group move away until again the field coalesced a few laps later. After being overtaken by 'B' grade with three laps to go a clear run to the line for 'C' was anticipated. Unfortunately 'B' slowed while 'C' accelerated with the result that the 'C' grade riders had a restricted width of road on which to contest the sprint. Unfortunate, but

that's the way things sometimes go. However, its doubtful that it made a difference to the results, for Ben Smith scored his second win in consecutive rides to finish just ahead of Chris Unicomb, Peter Luger, trial rider Anthony Banks with Alan Graham and Adam Godwin riding into 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> places respectively. Last man in was Dom Bruehwiler, recently returned from Melbourne who admitted to "too much Pud". Dom was a high profile club and committee member and Patron a few years ago before he moved to the wilds of Victoria, and we expect that performance will improve dramatically once he gets a few km into his thighs.

'B' grade was a sight to behold as it stretched half way up the finishing straight. There were a number of attempts to break up the 46-strong field, the first attack coming after two laps when Joe Radisic and Lee Pothast had a 40metre lead, only to be absorbed by the beginning of the following lap. Robert Heinrich and Anthony Bourn were next to go after 15 minutes and there were other small gaps that appeared only to be closed down until a promising looking break was held by Joe Radisic and Jaimie Kirkwood at the 35minute mark. The duo stayed out front for over 2 laps but when brought back they were replaced by Peter Morris and Tim Mollison. At the bell the ranks closed again, leaving the sprint to a mass affair that saw all the recognised sprinters in contention. In a wild dash to the line, Paul Speyers held off a flying Ian McFall by a couple of lengths, while the next places were taken respectively by Scott Ayles, Michael Rossiter, Gary Suckling, Terry Andrews and Brett Russell.

There was no slacking among the field of 40 riders in 'A' grade, so much so that there were fewer breaks than witnessed in recent events, a couple in the field reporting that the pace was so hot that few were prepared to take off from the front. There were a few exceptions and Sam Smith and Chris Glasby decided to stir thing up on lap 3 when they opened up a lead of 50metres. Another brave couple were Brett Stapleton and Christian Singleton who lasted out front for three laps after the 17minute mark, while the most ambitious of all, Chris

Glasby held a two lap gap in a solo effort at about the 35 minutes into the race. Efforts to bring Chris back saw a split occur in the field but that was closed down in a lap. The indefatigable Chris who put his head down again with less than 10minutes to go to the 2 laps-to-go sign and after a valiant effort was caught just as he crossed the line for the bell. As Chris said after finishing last — "nothing ventured, nothing gained".

With such a large class field there was great anticipation while awaiting the sprint and in an electric finish, Bradeley Hall proved victorious over Ryan Suckling, Sam Smith, Doug Stewart, Ian Gregory, Paul Foxwell, Richard Kelly and the rest of the field.

Following the event, sponsor Matt Tognini 'Humbly' presented the prizes.

# 24 February: Graded Criteriums Wangara

A very pleasant sunny morning with a cooling breeze that appealed to all 106 starters. With CAs Masters Championship run on the same morning it came as no surprise to see numbers down on the previous week's racing at Kewdale but breaking the century was still a good total and in addition the quality of the fields remained high.

'A' grade with 27 starters saw attacks from the word 'go', Deane Emslie opening up a 250 meter lead on lap 1 that wasn't nullified until the beginning of the 4<sup>th</sup> time past the start. Paul Lamond stayed in no-

man's land for much of this time and the effort probably hit him later in the race. Matt Tognini also jumped from the bunch when Deane was brought back but his move was quickly nullified. The eventual decisive move came after 13 minutes when Andy Jarvis, Ryan Suckling, Jeff Brooks and Carlo Cecchele opened up a lead of 50 metres. A lap later they had stretched the lead to 15seconds but after vet another circuit Carlo moved back to the comfort of the peleton. Sensing the danger of the leading trio, Andrew Brierley, Hilton McMurdo and Doug Stewart put down their heads and by the 30minute mark had caught the three escapees. The combination meant curtains for the remainder of the field and they steadily widened the gap that had increased to 50seconds at the 40minute mark. With three laps to go the breakaway began to split, as first Ryan Suckling and Jeff Brooks attacked, followed at 2 to go when Ryan this time accompanied by Andrew Brierley went into aggressive mode. Just after the bell, the leading duo had been joined by Hilton McMurdo who buried himself to get on, a move that no doubt dampened his finish, for at the finish he was placed 3<sup>rd</sup> behind Andrew, with Ryan Suckling taking a well deserved win after all his hard work at the front of the field. Doug Stewart a few seconds behind, accompanied by Jeff Brooks in 5<sup>th</sup> and Andy Jarvis in 6<sup>th</sup>. Andrew Dawson led in the chasing bunch just ahead of Carlo Ceccelle.

'B' grade also saw its share of action with Anthony Collis attempting an early break when the race was 14 minutes old, a lead that he held for over two laps with Tim Mollison trying desperately to breach the gap. After 20 minutes, Anthony had been absorbed but Tim Mollison kept up his effort to be joined by Brett Looney and Mark Anastasa. However, at the 26 minute mark what looked like a winning move had been absorbed by the hard-chasing bunch. At that juncture, Merv Byfield sensed it was a good time to attack and opened up a gap that he held for another 14 minutes, only to suffer for his sins when abandoning with 'no legs' after he was caught. Jaimie Kirkwood was the next to go but only managed to open up a lead of about 10 seconds with 2 laps to go. All came together for the final lap and in a scintillating sprint Brett Russell triumphed over Matt Davis, Nathan Mitchell and Mark

Anatasas, with Ben Smith taking 5<sup>th</sup>, Andrew Duff and Mark Yancazos equal 6th, and Nick Smith in 8<sup>th</sup> to take the final cash prize. The Russells' finished like bookends – Brett finishing 1<sup>st</sup> and his dad, Mick, last of the finishers (3 DNFs).

'C' grade, as usual, saw a limited number of attacks, Greg Mumme being among the few at the 20minute mark, and Anna Kauffman striking on two or three occasions towards the end of the event but at a time when the bunch was going to close everything down. The event saw the return of Steph Ratcliffe after a few years away from the club, and he didn't disappoint by finishing 3<sup>rd</sup> overall. The sprint was taken decisively by Anthony Banks with a 3-bikelength lead over Mitchell Law with Steph another 2 lengths behind. Dave Mundy finished alongside Steph for 4th place, and Javan Wolsoncroft in 5<sup>th</sup> and Mick Brown 6<sup>th</sup> were also in close contention.

'D' saw an action filled event with the challenge being set after four laps as Brian Buck, Bruce Abbott and Tracy Suckling sped off the front. For the remainder of the race they steadily ploughed ahead by moving roughly 10 seconds a lap faster than the chasers. In the bunch, Doug Macdonald did his utmost to bring them back, being prominent in the chase on every lap. Over the last two laps the chasers began to peg the leaders back, but the effort was too late and the leading trio headed the bunch by 12 seconds at the bell. In the sprint, Bruce Abbott was unbeatable and probably rode himself into 'C' grade as a result of his performance not only in this race but in his results over the previous few weeks. Brian Buck finished a couple of lengths down on Bruce, while Tracy Suckling rode an excellent race to finish 3<sup>rd</sup>. Richard Barville led in the peleton while Ian Broadley and Doug Macdonald filled the remainder of the six prizes.

'E' grade saw a deadly attack by Heather Sanderson who went on the offensive as the starter announced the 'off'. In a lonely ride in which she headed the field for the duration of the event, Heather stuck it into the lads and in the bargain managed to lap most of the field. With a stiff following breeze taking riders up to the

finish, Heather reported that the hard part of the race was the downhill section at the back of the circuit – something verified by others who said they'd struggled on that part of the course. Laurie Muccarione accompanied Derek Mayall for much of the race but sprinted to lead him over the line, while Vice-President Denis Robinson finished 4<sup>th</sup>. Kevin Hart was next to finish, while oldest rider of the day, Des Williams survived to finish in 6<sup>th</sup> place.

# **Points Score update up to 17 February**

With still 4 qualifying races to go there's lots of room for changes.
