Race Results

9 December, Criteriums, Kewdale

Gusty and hard conditions up the home straight met the 68 starters who rode not only for race placings but also for the final battle in the Willing Homes Criterium series points score. The moves in the bunch became difficult to read because of the ‘jokes’ that were obviously being played but it was certainly an entertaining day with lots of attacking riding.

The ‘A’ graders event looked as if it was settled in the opening laps when Gary Collett, Jason Rolfe and Chris Glasby broke and stayed away for the rest of the race, though when Matt Poyner Matt Tognini and Gary Wright bridged the gap with three or four laps to go the winner was picked by every gambler on the course. Despite a valiant effort by Gary Collett who finished second, Matt Poyner once again proved his sprinting ability while Chris Glasby Matt Tognini and Jason Rolfe finished behind in that order.

Largest field of the day was ‘B’ grade with 20 starters. It was a race full of attacks but man of the race was without doubt Ian Lyne whose orange jersey was always close to the front. His first couple of breaks proved short-lived, but showing that perseverance pays he again sloped off with four to go, caught the bunch napping and time trialed to a well-deserved victory of some 50metres. There was a battle Royal for the placings with Ian McFall pulling

out all stops to beat sprint ‘king’ Mick Russell to the line. There was a close fought match for the remaining prizes with Atilla Nagy, Peter Shanley. Lawrence Wynne and Alan Clark filling those places.

‘C’ grade also saw an attacking race, to the extent that Anne Rossiter examined husband Colin’s bidon when she saw him move out of the shelter of the bunch to attack on the home straight in the early part of the race. However, all came together for the vital bell lap, with the final dash to the line going to a fast finishing Bill Crout who held off Ian Logan with a last desperate lunge. The omnipresent Doug Macdonald was close on their wheels, with Jeff Usher, Derek McVickers, Jon Dooner and Roger Scott filling the rest of the prize placings.

‘D’ grade remained a solid bunch as it sped around the circuit. There were a few attacks but none made a dent in the ranks, so once again allowing the sprinters to create mayhem at the line. Paul Crespi kept up his recent spate of excellent rides to finish first, but close to his wheel was Ray Craig sporting an ancient vest that reflected his vintage, he being only two months off his 80th birthday. Steve Goulds was a length or two behind for third place, while Brian Kennedy who had driven up from Bunbury, again showed that he was taking his come-back seriously. Ernst Kreutzer was also in contention when just beating Lindsay Froyland for a couple of ‘Roger Sutton’ points when finishing sixth.

13 January 2008, Criteriums, Wangara

A great day for racing, a slight breeze, sunshine and warm pleasant conditions. Folks must still have been getting over their Christmas Pud, for while a reasonable turnout of 69, this was less than anticipated. Largest group of the day (as usual) was 'B' grade with 28 riders, while 'A' grade sported only 11, and that dropped by one when Jamie Somers suffered mechanical problems before the start and was allowed to ride in 'B'.

Despite the small number, 'A' grade filled their 50mins and 2 laps with some explosive riding. Especially aggressive was Jason Rolfe who was active at the front with Phil Johnston. On the bell lap it was Jason with a 30metre lead, a gap that he retained to the finish. George Miller looked sharp as he came in ahead of the rest of the bunch, with Keith Winch, Fred Landon and the rest close to his wheel.

'B' grade filled a fair part of the course and the large group stretched and contracted from lap to lap – yet no one managed to open up a leading gap. Peter Shanley and Matt Davis were particularly noticeable in their forays off the front but as with the other grades, the last few hundred metres was what determined the outcome of the race. Perhaps not surprising 'blow-in' Jamie Somers took the verdict, while Matt Wilding who had also featured aggressively throughout the race was a few metres behind. Riding his first race for a season, third place went to a pleased Terry Andrews who took it as a good omen for the Vets Tour Down Under in January, while Matt Davis and Steve Rouse filled the fourth and fifth places.

'C' grade saw a fast pace but there were no heroics and the field stayed largely together until the final 500metres. Mark Leaker led out the sprint which he won in convincing manner – while the 'perpetual second, Doug Macdonald finished again in that position, with Ian Turner third. Allan Clarke on his come-back race following his pre Christmas accident, proved the rest had done him good when finishing in fourth place

The 'senior' 'D' group was in good form and the 16 riders turned on the juice to unship a few riders in the early stages of the race. In the final foray to the line, it was first-time rider Bevan Buichell who triumphed over another first timer, Tracy Ober, while our oldest member, Ray Craig finished a comfortable third just ahead of Ernst Kreutzer and Andrew Lorrimer.

20 January 2008, Criteriums, Kewdale

A bit on the hard side on the back of the circuit but otherwise beautiful conditions for the 74 starters in the second event of the New Year. 'B' grade again sported the largest field with 25 starters, 'C' grade 19, 'D' grade 17 and 'A' grade only 13 (where have all the young folk gone?). As usual, the premier grade was full of fire but despite some valiant attacks nothing succeeded until about the 35-minute mark when a group of five riders opened a gap. This they kept to the finish where Jason Rolfe repeated his recent good form by beating Paul Brown to the line by the length of his machine. Pedro Turibaka took 3rd place half-a—wheel ahead of George Miller and Gary Collett.

The large 'B; grade saw lots of action from the word 'go', but the decisive move came after 25 minutes of racing when five riders opened a gap that was never closed. New rider Rod Marton took the initiative at the bell when he jumped away and there was some hesitation in chasing. By the time the rest had seen the danger he was well away and at the finish held a clear lead of 20-metres over a fast finishing Ian Lyne, Bob Addy, Mark Edele and Steve Dodd. Matt Wilding led in the rest of the field some 30 seconds later to take sixth place ahead of Andrew Duff who was riding his first race following an accident in 2007.

New rider, Aaron Baxter took 'C' grade by storm, riding strongly to a 50metre lead with some five laps to go. This he held easily to the finish, leaving the sprint to be keenly contested by the rest of the field. The verdict in the bunch sprint came as no surprise, as Doug Macdonald again showed a clean pair of heels to his compatriots. Mark Burke sprinted well to hold third place ahead of Brian Buck and Jeff usher, while Chris Hunt took sixth and last of the money prizes.

A breakaway in the first lap by previous week's winner Bevan Buirchell and Colin Bloomfield looked as if it might work out. However, a determined effort in the bunch

saw them claw their way to the front to finally catch the pair with less than 10 minutes to go. In the sprint Bevan Buirchell again proved triumphant but our oldest rider, Ray Craig, wasn't far behind, while Andrew Lorrimer again showed his improving form when taking out third place. Ernst Kreutzer was also in the frame, while Brian Kennedy managed to get back some of his petrol money when finishing in fifth place, before his drive back to Bunbury.

27 January 2008, Peel CC – Jim Thompson Memorial Races, Rockingham

With weather forecast in the high thirties there were some fears that the 'A' graders, being on last, would have sticky and uncomfortable 55minutes in the sun. However, a sea breeze cooled things down considerably and it turned out to be a nice

day for racing. The races were put on by Peel CC in memory of local Councillor and West Coast Masters rider Jim Thompson who tragically died when he crashed in a race some 17 years ago and whose family support the memorial event. The races also marked the anniversary of the death (of natural causes) of Jim Campbell, and Jim's son Stewart rang up before the race to donate \$200 in prizes for the occasion. Jim's memory was marked with a respectful minute's silence, with many in the ranks still having fresh memories of that tragic event.

All races other than 'E' grade were run on a sprint points system, with there being points allocated for the first four in each sprint in each grade (5, 3, 2,1 points), and an overall award being determined by the person with the greatest number of points on the day (with some adjustment for number of sprints). With sprints every 10 minutes or so, there was some hectic action with most results being determined by a mass sprint. The only exceptions were in 'C' grade where John Dixon time trialled off the front to take two five-pointers, and Bob Addy's solo attack in 'B' grade that saw him stay away to take one. The overall winner was George Miller who took maximum points in 'A'..

'E' grade was run as a scratch race with the man-of-the-day being birthday boy Jack Iveson who celebrated his 73rd by not only cleaning up on two primes but by also clearly winning the final sprint. Showing great improvement over recent form, Leo Enright finished 2nd overall, just ahead of Alan Taylor and Bob Taylor.

'D' grade saw Polish visitor, Boris Fortuna take the first two sprints ahead of Phil Edwards. However, some confusion and misunderstanding saw Boris get in with the wrong bunch, leaving the remaining two sprints to Phil Edward who ran out overall winner, having been second to Boris in the first two sprints. Barry Eversden rode consistently well to take three 2nd places, while Andrew Lorrimer rode well to take two 3^d places and a 4th as against Ernie Kreutzer's two 3rds and a fourth.

The 'C' graders saw some solid bunch work until about 15 minutes to go when John Dixon made an impressive run for the line that took him to two sprint wins. However, this wasn't enough to determine the overall win, as Aaron Baxter had taken the first two sprints and also took out two 3rd placings. Mark Cummings, Doug Macdonald and Derek McVickers were also prominent in the dashes to the line. Misfortune struck when Richard Le Tessier who took out fourth place in the first sprint, touched a kerb, came down and damaged his shoulder.

For once, 'B' grade wasn't the largest field, their 16 starters being dimmed by the 18 riders in 'C'. It was, however, a strong field that witnessed some scintillating sprinting. There were a few consistent names that cropped up, with eventual points winner Matt Davis, just back from his victory in his Road Race grade in the prestigious Veterans Classic that accompanied the Tour Down Under, taking out a first, three 2nd places and a third place. Peter Shanley also shone when taking one first, one 2nd, one third and two 4th places. Mark Edele also featured in the first four in every sprint, while France Coppini took out two 1st places, and Bob Addy had one to his credit.

The premier grade saw both furious riding and a few laps where they went slower than their companion 'C' grade riders who were on the circuit at the same time. However, there was no doubt as to who was the dominant sprinter, and also points winner of the day, for George Miller took out all five sprints to the line. Dave Berglund attempted to stop his domination but ended up with three 2nd placings and two 4ths, while Phil Deisel managed a 2nd. two thirds and a fourth placing. Fred Landon also showed good form with three 3rd placings, while Ian McFall ended up with points for his two 4th placings.

3 February 2008, Criteriums Kewdale

Another glorious day in the high 20's, though the calm conditions experienced at the start line was deceptive according to some of the 78 starters on the business end of the racing. As usual, 'A' grade saw lots of action, with attacks from the start. George Miller, Eric Cox and Pedro Turibaka were active off the front after about 10 minutes, while Chris Glasby attacked at the 20-minute mark when the others were brought back to the bunch. Barrie Smith tried at about the 21-minute mark but within a lap he too was back in the shelter of the bunch. The decisive move came soon after when George Miller, Eric Cox and Paul Lamond drove off the front and remained there for the next 20 minutes. Previous to this, George had punctured, taken a lap out and he finished on a borrowed machine. George, still bearing the scars of a collision with a

tree the day previous when on his mountain bike, still looked competitive despite his handicaps, but over the final 200metres it was obvious that the decision would go to either Eric Cox or Paul Lamond. There was only a few cms between them on the line with the decision going to Paul who took victory in a last desperate kick. A few hundred metres behind, Chris Glasby opened up a 30metre gap on the main bunch and held the position to the line. Pedro Turibaka took the bunch sprint ahead of Wayne Towler, Terry Andrews and Jason Rolfe.

'B' grade with 25 riders stayed surprisingly sedate throughout the race with no-one being given the opportunity to shine. Mark Cummings attempted a few breaks but only in the last lap when in company of Peter Shanley was there any success and they crossed the line some 20metres ahead of the rest of the field. Peter was a clear winner, while the bunch sprint was won by France Coppini from racing returnee Wayne Lally. In 5th place came Steph Ratcliffe alongside Rick Churchill, Laurence Wynne and Ken Harvey.

In 'C' grade there was much early action by a determined Paul Wighton who stayed ahead of the field for the first 15 minutes and attacked again to open up another lead soon after being returned to the bunch. It was the turn of newly returned Kath Dixon and Ian Stewart at the 25 minute mark, a move that caused the bunch to chase hard and provide a launching pad for Kath's dad, John, who soloed to the line for the second week in succession. Finishing some 50metres behind, Derek McVickers looked good as he outsprinted Roger Scott, Ian Logan and Brian Buck and the rest of the group into the minor positions. Bill Crout's recovery from a dog attack during the week (the dog won) was happy with his sixth placing.

Sixteen riders saw a healthy number for 'D' grade and after some stretching towards the middle of the race things settled down. The finale came in the form of a mass sprint to the line. An attack

before the final bend proved decisive for Ernst Kreutzer who opened up the sprint as he rounded the final corner. Jack Iveson gave no quarter, and indeed screamed 'victory' as he kicked near the line, but was sadly mistaken when the verdict was given to Ernst. Brian Kennedy who got up at 4.00am to drive to the event from Bunbury came in third, with Ray Craig, Lindsay Froyland and Andrew Lorrimer close to his wheel.
