The event at Chidlow on 29 May saw a number of riders puncture at the far end of the circuit. Amazingly, only one carried a spare. This was not the Tour de France where there are following cars – there were no huge cols to climb and no thousands of Euros at stake, so arguments about having to reduce weight are somewhat ridiculous. Some years ago, on a foul day in the hills we had one rider caught in a similar situation who suffered from hypothermia when the hoped-for sag wagon didn't appear. For a while after that event, riders took the 'spares' issue seriously, but obviously it's a lesson that has been forgotten. Do the sensible thing and carry a spare!

Changes to Wandii Circuit

Following complaints by a local because of congestion in Brooks Way (and explaining why we scream at riders who crowd the road!), we have had to change the start and finish to De Haer Road. Noms will be taken and parking is available at the **Wandii Community Centre** on de Haer (strictly no parking on that road). In addition, because of the new sub-division on Lyon Road, the circuit will now turn left on Wandii Drive at Bodeman Road (a bit hilly but smooth), and

RACE RESULTS

1 May – 25km Time Trial, Championships, Herne Hill.

Fifty-seven starters faced the timekeepers on a bright and relatively calm morning. Some excellent times were recorded, though the 'star' performance went to 78 year old Michael Geurin who outperformed a large proportion of his younger compatriots to take out the age standard 1st prize and gold medal with a time of 40mins 15 seconds that beat his standard time by 13min 03secs. Bob Addy rode strongly to beat 40 minutes by 27secs for an AS of 10min 59secs, while the bronze medal went to Jennie Sammons with an excellent time of 40m 11secs and a plus of 10 41.

Fastest of the day and also taking 7th of the eight age standard cash prizes was Paul Williams who recorded 33m 46secs. Paul was followed by last man off, Troy Coulthard with a time of 34mins 42secs, while Brian Farrelly stood in 3rd place on the rostrum with a ride of 35m 41secs.

22 May – Grd Scratch Races, Wandí

Another day of blue skies, and relatively still conditions greeted the 129 starters at the season's first event at Wandí. Despite the large fields not one negative incident was recorded that required the help of our recently qualified St Johns first aiders, while the referees had nothing but praise for the thoughtful standard of riding. However, crowds blocking the highway on Brooks Road at the start of the race, and the parked cars in front of one property, upset one or more of the locals, resulting in a visit from the local Council Ranger.

Racing in all grades was animated and little leeway was given to the few breaks that occurred during the day, resulting in fast averages for the circuit. All grades finished in mass sprints. In 'A' grade Sam Smith again proved triumphant, while Andrew Brierley showed he was still a force to be reckoned with when he finished a couple of lengths behind Sam in his first event with the club this year. Tim Mollison recently promoted from 'B' grade showed his mettle when just holding off Gary Wright who finished 4th and who edged out Mike Pardon, Richard Kelly and new rider Richard Horn.

'B' grade saw a mass sprint at the finish line, filling the width of the road with riders as they crossed the line. It was a close call but not even the camera could split the first two riders, resulting in Tony Mott and Paul Speyer being given equal first. In the wild rush at the finish, Stephen Farran, Paul Prottey, John Liso, and Matt Callaghan finished close to their tails.

'C' grade also saw a mass charge, though the experienced Mick Russell kicked to make sure of victory by a clear two lengths. Leading in the bunch was first time rider with the club, Charlie Gargett, who just headed Lee Potthurst, Daniel Walmsley and first lady rider, Kelly Gray, across the line.

'D' grade performed well, moving faster around the circuit than in the past, averaging only 25 seconds slower than 'C'. Familiar faces filled the top positions with Wayne Allen crossing half-a-length ahead of Bob Stephens who was making a

comeback following a long layoff. The consistent Bill Stibbs scored extra points for his third place, while Wayne Gordon, Brian Sawyer and Rod Babel, with the latter having recently returned after a 1,000km ride in the deserts of the north, finished in that order.

The nine-strong 'E' Grade contingent containing a rejuvenated Roy Swift and Canberra visitor Lindsay Graham, rode steadily to record an average that was exactly the same as the last time they rode the course. In a hard-fought finish, Roy managed to ease ahead of Des Williams just before the line, while Dave Nangle showed that his secret training in the hills was paying dividends, when taking third ahead of Derek Mayall.

29 May, Graded Scratch, Chidlow 'A'

A reasonable field of 77 riders turned up at the Chidlow Tavern to sign on for what might have been the last gasp of summer – a day of bright sunshine and temperatures in the low 20s. 'B' had the largest turnout with 26 riders, 'A' followed with 20; 'C' with 16 in 'C', 11 in 'D' and four in 'E' – perhaps a reflection of allergy to hills in the

lower grades! Average times were on par with those recorded in the last scratch event on the circuit and a number of breaks kept the rent-a-crowd at the finish entertained.

'A' grade saw early action when six riders pulled away on the hill approaching the fire station, to take a lead of 150metres, which they steadily increased over the following laps. With three laps to go Phil Johnston, Martin Depiazzi, Roger Knight, Tim Mollison, and Paul Lamond had a lead of 1m 20secs that increased to 2 minutes on the final two laps. Martin Depiazzi proved strongest on the long grind to the finish line, while George Miller showed he had returned to the fold by finishing a couple of lengths behind. Tim Mollison kept up his podium record since being promoted from 'B' grade, while Paul Lamond, Phil Johnston, and Roger Knight flying the Total Travel flag, shared the rest of the prize-money.

'B' grade was witness to the ride of the day when Paul Prottey time trialled to a convincing win of almost 2 minutes. The opening laps saw a number of attacks: lap 1 saw four riders at 70 metres; lap two Paul Prottey and Ian Trayler pulled away to a lead of 400 metres, but the following lap Paul took flight never to be seen again. The uphill finish kept the judges happy as the bunch finished in crocodile file, the line being headed by Steve Farren, new member Darren McPortland, Gavin Lawson, Ian Trayler and Bob Addy.

'C' grade stayed much together, though at the bell Andrew Larter who enjoyed a lead of about 100metres was brought back before the final hilly section of the circuit. Riding his first event of the year, Laurence Wynne showed he had lost none of his old spark when he beat regular place-getter Antony Bourn across the line. Mike Barton rode well to take third place, while Peter Neuzerling and Ross Coulter crossed just ahead of sixth placed and first female rider, Kelly Gray.

'D' grade saw the field break up on the first lap when Ian Broadley and Bob Stephens took the event under control with a lead of 100metres as they passed the

finish line. The tandem pegged away steadily to lead by 50secs with two to go, a lead that had increased to 1m 20secs by the time the two riders sprinted to the line. Ian Broadley took the initiative to attack with 150 metres to go and Bob sat up when he realized he wasn't going to best him. Bruce Abbott led in the remaining riders, who were scattered in ones and twos.

The 'E' graders were low in numbers but high in spirits, as they completed their three laps of the circuit. With Alan Taylor acting as Lanterne Rouge, the other three stayed comfortably together until the bell lap when Dave Nangle attacked on the hills to take a lead of 100m over Denis Robinson at the line. Fran Watson finished not far behind, happy to have finished an event after her recent preoccupation with chronic fatigue. Dave rode his last race until the 2-day as he's off to sunny Canada for most of our winter. Get in the miles Dave!

5 June – Grd Scratch Races, Pickering Brook

Another great turnout on a chilly but bright day in the hills when 127 riders faced the starter. Some excellent racing on the day and keeping everyone happy was that despite the large fields there were no accidents.

'A' grade witnessed attacking riding from the word 'go' and at the end of the first lap five riders held a lead of 150 metres on the chasing 28-man field. At the start of lap 2, Wayne Thomson and George Miller had left the rest of the break behind to lead by over 250metres, but after a hard chase all were together as they hit the start of the following lap. However, with 6 laps to go a split occurred that contained a strong contingent that spearheaded the race for the remainder of the 76km. That statement requires a qualification for on the final lap John Gregg moved off the front to build up an impressive lead of exactly a minute over the chasing bunch of five that included Sam Smith, Chris Glasby, Andrew Brierley, and George Miller. Some time later, Tim Mollison led in the rest of the field.

'B' grade with 44 starters had the largest field of the day, and probably the largest ever in the club's recent history. As with 'A' there were a number of notable attacks with Paul Prottey, winner of the previous week's Chidlow event, along

with Chris Roberts, opening a 250m gap at the end of the first lap. On lap 2 they were joined by Bob Addy, and Sean Crummey (who later punctured), leaving them still in the lead for a further lap before being absorbed by the attentive bunch. Bob attempted a solo with two to go but on the bell lap most of the peleton were together. In a close sprint John Clark had a narrow victory over Chris Clarke (no relation – note the 'e'), closely followed by Simon Docherty, Darren McPartland, Paul Dobson and Paul Prottey, with the remainder finishing in close order behind.

'C' grade, with 30 riders, saw few attacks that stood out – though that observation came from the finishing line! Moving at a very respectable 13m 15secs per lap there was little chance of a successful break, though Antony Bourn had a go with two laps to go when he opened up a lead of 300metres. Antony was caught before the final lap but stayed with a small break that contested the finishing sprint. Lee Pottharst was the triumphant winner, beating trial rider Peter Hammond by half-a-length, In turn, he finished half-a length ahead of Richard Monaghan, Javon Wallsoncroft, Alison Dyson (who beat husband Dave!), Antony Bourn and Shannon Arnott. It was good to see the female contingent being aggressively competitive in such a large field. A problem with viewing the numbers meant that it was only with difficulty that the placings were verified – though as noted below, Scott Stephens pulled off the impossible by retrieving the placings after some juggling with the camera and using his keen powers of observation!

A lucky 13 members started in 'D' grade and completed the race with a respectable average of just under 15mins per lap. A few of the riders found the final hill up Repatriation Road a bit on the difficult side, but there was a fair sized group that lived to contest the final sprint. With 40 metres to go it looked as if the winner would be Geoff Gilmore, but it was Bob Stephens who triumphed with a last kick. Wayne Gordon showed his improving form when recording third place ahead of

Dave Walker, who showed a great improvement over his showing at Chidlow.

'E' grade – small but mighty and with an average age of well over 75 years, the 'bunch' rode tempo for the first lap before Denis Robinson and Derek Mayall pulled ahead. With 2 laps to go Brian Paxman began to gain on the duo, but on the bell lap it was Derek Mayall who rode strongly to solo away to arrive at the line with almost 2 minutes to spare over Denis,

Eighty-eight nominations and 84 starters proved a good omen for the Memorial Race that commenced after the President had read out a list of past members from the Honour List. All present joined in a minute's silence.

With bright sunshine but a hard wind against the field on the back straight, and over \$1,000 in cash prizes on offer, it looked as if it would be a good bet to back scratch. However, at the end of the 1st lap, while they had gained a minute on block, which started at 2mins, they had only dented the 4-minute bunch by 25secs. At that stage they still had a fighting chance having picked up the 6-minute group by a minute a lap, but while averaging 13m 30secs per lap for the first three laps, the pace fell back to 14 mins plus for the remaining half of the race - possibly a case of too many sitting in for the Fastest Time award, that eventually went to Doug Stewart!

Meanwhile, the long markers at 23 and 28 mins held on until the bell lap when a large, fast-moving bunch representing all groups from 4mins to the 18minute mark swamped them. With 100metres to go, Dave Rawlings sprang from the pack to

cross the line with a three or four length victory for 'Total Travel' over a closely packed group led by Steve Marks, Mark Anastasas, John Clark, Tony Mott, Tim Mollison and a host of others, all keen to share in the 15 cash prizes on offer.

Unfortunately we had to cancel the race at the last moment because of a hitch in receiving a police approval. Apologies to all and hopefully it won't happen again.

26 June – Gr Scratch, Neerabup

Following the deluge of the previous day and dark skies in the morning of the race, it was a pleasant surprise to see 71 keen faces turn up for noms at Neerabup. However, Frans Buissink who is having a long run of bad luck with his tyres, pulled out just before the start, making the field a round 70. Only casualty of the day was Jon Dooner in 'C' grade, who fortunately only suffered a few cuts and grazes, but glad to say there was no damage to his bike!

The pace was high thanks to the relatively calm conditions, and all groups except 'A' grade lapped at 20 seconds faster than on the previous ride on the course. 'A' grade, that rode their first lap at tempo, pulled out the pin in the second lap when a group of seven decided to attack on the hillier back-side of the course. The group steadily pulled away, their 50metre lead on lap 2 moving to about 300 metres on lap 3 and shifting out to 2mins 30secs with 3 to go. The result, an average of 11min 40secs that was exactly the same as their last ride on the course. While there were seven in the break, Mike Pardon who said he found the pace somewhat hot, decided to abandon the fray after a few laps at the front. This left six certainties for the cash prizes. George Miller tried a lone break on the final lap but in vain, as the

chasers closed in with over a km to go, leaving George legless in fifth place, and leaving the verdict open to a hard fought sprint in which Andrew Brierley pipped Doug Stewart on the line. The pair was closely followed by John Gregg and Mike Tapscott, while Lee Parker came in sixth. The chasing group sprint was also hotly contested, with Wayne Thomson beating Paul Speyer for 7th place.

'B' grade starting with 21 riders, a figure that matched 'A', saw a fast race, though (at least from the start line) there was little evidence of any heroic attempts at a break. Thankfully the camera was in good focus, for the judges only managed to pick out the first four places, so closely were the riders bunched as they finished the final lap. Winner was Darren McPartland who pulled a length over Keith Gill, Tony Mott and Rob Martin, the latter making this a successful comeback after his race accident earlier in the year. These riders were closely followed by John Liso, Bob Addy and Jamie Kirkman.

With a few laps ridden in under 13 minutes, 'C' grade must have given the handicapper some moments of contemplation, as they showed they weren't too far off their 'B' grade compatriots. Prominent in driving the group was the stirring figure of Alison Dyson who seemed to be giving no quarter to those hanging at the back of the bunch. Unfortunately, when Jon Dooner hit the road, Alison thought it her duty to stop with him, and thus lost her chance of showing up the boys at the end of the race. With the race wide open, the sprinters made it their day and Charlie Gargett crossed the line with a length advantage over Geoff Gilmore and Peter Neuzerling, who, in turn, just edged out Todd Ryan. Mike Burton claimed 5th place and Bob Stephens 6th. A bit of confusion at the pointy end of the race meant only six places were recorded, so apologies for those who find their names missing from the finishing list!

The one thing to say about 'D' grade was they were consistent, with almost every lap covered within a few seconds of

the average time of 14m 20secs. With seven starters, there was little chance of anyone getting away without an immediate response from other riders, but in the final two laps there were signs of attrition as people slipped off the back. On the bell lap, Allan MacDonald attacked to weaken the opposition, and came across the line well clear of 2nd placed Darryl Miller, with the rest of the field spread out over a couple of minutes behind the winner.

Starting with six riders, 'E' grade suffered an early retirement when Alan Taylor decided that following his recent health problems he should pull out of the race. This left five riders who stuck to each other like glue for the rest of the six laps which they covered at a respectable average of 16minutes – not bad when considered that two of the riders (the eventual winner and the 4th placed) were over 80 years of age, while the rest were pushing their late 70s! In the sprint finish, the supremo turned out to be Des Williams, while Roy Swift and Derek Mayall finished in that order to take out the cash prizes
