RACE RESULTS

5 February – Keady Humble Tognini Classic (KHT) Criteriums – Kewdale

Thanks to Matt ‘Humble’ Tognini for sponsoring this very successful event that attracted a record to date (for this season) 106 riders. Stirred up by extra prize-money and a prime for all grade races, there was much action, with attacks being seen in all divisions.

‘A’ grade with 21 riders saw the now familiar pattern of frequent attacks. Mike Tapscott was at the fore about 15 minutes into the race and stayed off the front for just over 2 laps, while Doug Stewart came out to take the prime at the half-way-mark. Roger Knight resplendent in his red ‘Total Travel’ team jersey was joined by Scott Ayles after 40 minutes, and they remained in the lead for three laps. When absorbed, and no doubt stimulated by the TV coverage, ‘Total Travel’ once more hit the front in the form of Ian Lyne who was accompanied by Michael Bowles for a lap but at the pointy head of the race everything came together as the sprinters girded their loins to fly down the finishing straight. Doug Stewart was in his usual scintillating form to outprint Gary Wright by three lengths, with Paul Foxwell another couple of lengths behind in third place. Perhaps deserving because of their previous efforts, fourth and fifth places were filled by Ian Lyne and Michael Tapscott, with Richard Kelly just easing out Tim Mollison for 6th place at the line.

‘B’ grade with 35 entries was by far the largest bunch of the day and the gathered masses were pleased as attacks went off the front despite the high pace. Rory Murray was first out of the blocks and by the 2nd lap he enjoyed a 100metre lead. Andrew Patterson was also seen to be stirring up the action at the front of the field, as was Magnus Rudisele. As the race entered the 2nd half, Roger Middlebrook flew up the straight to take the \$20 prime and soon after Andrew Candy and Merv Byfield decided to chance their luck with the duo opening up a lead of about 130 metres at the 35 minute mark. With three laps to go,

fresh face appeared just off the front, Paul Lamond, Phillip Johnston and Greg McCoy, but their effort was in vain, the verdict being decided in the sprint by a powerful kick from Roger Middlebrook who beat Charlie Gargett by a length or so, with the consistent Ian McFall just behind. Also, the consistent Jon Liso was followed closely by Rob Martin, Nick Smith and Merv Byfield, with the remainder of the bunch breathing down their necks.

The normally complacent ‘C’ grade proved full of life, especially when Chris Reedman and Nick Crane took flight at the 15-minute point. Despite hard chasing from behind they kept away from the remainder for the rest of the race. Chris took the prime from Nick, and on the final lap he put in an attack to finish well clear, while Nick held off the bunch by 50 metres. Not to be denied, ‘Chopper’ Marshall surged over the line for third place, with Mick Russell on his tail, followed by Lee Potthast, Peter Neuzerling and the rest of the group.

‘D’ grade saw no big breaks, the most prominent being those of Wayne Gordon who opened up a small gap after 25 minutes of riding, and that of Allan MacDonald and Travis Kean with a 30metre lead with three laps to go. Entering the bell lap, all were together for the inevitable bunch sprint that on this occasion was taken by Wayne Allen from Doug Macdonald and Dave Dellar, with fourth going to Bob Stephens. Paul Greeney was fifth, while Jon Dooner gained a couple of extra points to his tally for the Points competition when taking sixth place. Geoff Gilmore took the \$20 prime.

‘E’ grade saw a rejuvenated Gerry Allen take out the prime and also the final sprint, thus adding bags of money to his private fortune. Roy Swift finished in second place being tempted out by the cool weather that eventuated on the day. The female contingent who had shown their colours with attacking riding throughout the race were also in contention at the finish, with Helen Peniston sprinting to 3rd place just ahead of Heather Sanderson

12 February - Criteriums, Rockingham.

Turned out to be a pleasant and cool morning and despite heavy rain closer to the City, Rockingham remained dry. With a fair number of 'A' graders participating in the Perth Criteriums, the group was down to 14 riders, with the largest group of the day being 'D' grade with 20 entrants, so making a grand total of 73 riders.

'E' grade proved a triumph for the ladies over the males (though we don't intend to start a gender war!). Helen Peniston opened up a gap halfway through the race and after a hard chase was joined by Heather Sanderson. The remainder split into ones and two's leaving the female duo to extend their lead. During the bell lap, Heather opened up a gap to cross eight seconds ahead of Helen, Ben Murdoch coming in third. Andrew Lorrimar in only his second race since last season found it hard going, while it was good to see Brian Kennedy find some form after his recent health problems.

'D' grade rode steadily at a fair pace for much of the race. Darryl Millar put down his head early in the race and looked as if he could hold a gap. However, he suffered later in the race and was tailed off, though like the good sport that he is, he stated that he'd enjoyed his foray off the front and wasn't disappointed with his ride. Travis Kean also shone for a lap or so when he took a lead of about 150metres on the bunch, but they were too attentive to let him get any further. In a closely contested sprint, Wayne Allen proved king of the sprint for the second week running when he beat Jon Dooner by a length or so, while Craig Sanford hit the podium for the first time when taking third place. Doug Willing was pleased to break

his recent drought when taking out fourth just ahead of the wiley Doug Macdonald, with Martin Van Voorthuizen taking extra points for sixth place.

'C' grade saw the large bunch disintegrate following an attack by Brian Buck, Enzo Cadelli and Rob McGowan on the third lap. On the sixth lap they were joined by Peter Neuzerling, Geoff Marshall and Mike Watson, with the hard working group extending their lead to 150 metres 20 minutes into the race. At about the 25-minute mark, the rest of the bunch seemed to give up, leaving the verdict to the breakaway group. A hiccup in the final lap when much to the consternation of the timekeeper they got mixed up with 'A' grade and missed the bell didn't seem to have changed the verdict, as they all joined in the sprint, with victory going to Geoff Marshall ahead of the consistently placed Peter Neuzerling. Enzo Cadelli was delighted with his first placing in the first three since his return to racing while Rob McGowan, Mike Watson and Brian Buck completed the route. It was nice to see Brian show great improvement over recent form, even though he looked as if he was suffering.

'B' grade saw lots of action that started when Rory Murray and Magnus Rudisele decided to attack on the first lap. They were away for two laps. Following their return to the comfort of the bunch, there were a number of attacks though none exceeded 50 metres until Paul Burke opened up a 200metre gap after 35 minutes. Joined a lap later following a hard stint by Paul Dobson, it looked as if they'd be happy to ride in together, but Paul decided otherwise and in the ride of the day he opened up a lead that extended the length of the finishing straight at the bell, and eased up to cruise across the line for a win that exceeded 500metres. Afton Galbraith kicked strongly to take second place just ahead of Ian McFall, the next placings being closely grouped, with Bruce McLennan, Sean Crummey and Steven Greenshields taking out the rest of the placings to sixth place.

'A' grade was enlivened by the frequent attacks of George Miller who commenced his forays on the third lap. However, the bunch appeared to be unconcerned, leaving George to dangle off the front for another three laps. Paul

Foxwell then decided to go but after leading the field by about 70 metres he decided discretion was the better part of valour and sat up to wait for his compatriots. Peter Shanley and Chris Peniston decided to have a dig at half-way through the race, but when brought back, George decided to have another fling, to be joined a lap later by Pedro Turibaka and Peter Shanley. However, all was in vain for the imposing figure of Doug Stewart charged down the right hand side of the road to easily take the sprint from Paul Foxwell and Roger Middlebrook. Mark Roberts and Richard Kelly dead heated for fourth place, while Gary Wright was placed sixth. This was Doug's fifth or sixth consecutive win, and set him well on the way to taking out the criterium points competition. Roger Middlebrook received the congratulations of the President for finishing in the first three of the Premier grade having progressed to this position from riding 'C' grade when he started riding with the club.

19 February - Criteriums, Kewdale.

The largest turnout of the year with 118 members turning out on a fine, comfortable but windy morning that hit riders as they headed up the finishing straight. 'A' and 'B' grades with 32 and 33 riders were respectively the largest groups, 'C' and 'D' were also close to equal in number with 20 and 19 respectively, while 'E' grade saw a valiant dozen. Quite a few trial riders and new members joined the field, all of which led to keenly contested and high quality fields.

The only incident of the day saw visiting Welshman Dai Sankey run out of road on a corner to go flying over his bars. Thankfully, no bones broken but a few bruises and scratches – though sad to say, his Campag levers suffered in the fall. Dai's 'D' grade rode hard and fast with all attempts to force the front of the bunch being annulled. Thus the finish was left to the final charge up the straight, Doug Macdonald proved too strong for the opposition which allowed him to ease off and still comfortably win ahead of Bob Stephens, new rider Jeff Gleadow, the consistently placed Jon Dooner and Dave Dellar, while John Flynn sopped up the last of the cash prizes.

First group off the mark was 'E' grade who managed to keep out of strife when overtaken by the charging aspirants in 'A' and 'C'. About halfway through the race the bunch split, leaving seven to contest the sprint to the line. Helen Peniston looked like a winner until

20 metres to go when overtaken by Roy Swift – a case of possibly pushing too high a gear into the headwind finish. Heather Sanderson left the sprint too late to contest the premier position but managed to hold off Derek Mayall, Ben Murdoch, Andrew Lorrimar and Denis Robinson who constituted the rest of the breakaway. Laurie Muccianrone riding his first race showed great spirit by finishing the race. Like other starters before him, he should show progress as the weeks go by.

'A' grade, proved as aggressive as usual, with attack coming after attack. Andrew Dawson was first to move towards the end of the 2nd lap. Matt Korten making his first appearance of the Crit season, accompanied by Scott Ayles and energetic George Miller went off the front at the 20-minute mark, while the former two were replaced by Gary Jones two laps later. In what looked like a serious move Wayne Keyser joined them after another lap and they enjoyed a lead of 150metres at the halfway mark. When absorbed by the chasing bunch, it was again the turn of Andrew Dawson who went off along with Gary Jones. The bunch see-sawed thereafter, with Greg Stoyles making a valiant attempt to distance himself but self destructing with about ten minutes to go. The sprint proved a triumph once again for Doug Stewart who bested Wayne Thompson and Troy Coulthard to the line. Paul Foxwell Matt Korten and Roger Middlebrook were next to finish.

'C' grade saw Geoff 'Chopper' Marshal and Justin McGoldrick chastised by the referee for taking pace from 'A' grade half-way through the race, though both were allowed to retain their prize-money. For most of the race, the group remained tightly packed, once more playing into the hands of the sprinters, though the pace was fast enough to see three DNF riders. In a scintillating sprint, one of our newer members Anthony Fitzgerald showed he will be a force to note when he beat Peter Neuzerling across the line by a couple of lengths. Justin McGoldrick was next to cross just ahead of Jeff Gilmore, trial rider Steve de Bono, and Steve Ryan,

As with the premier grade, 'B' proved full of fireworks. The first serious move came after 10 minutes when Merv Byfield, Jaimie Kirkwood and Rod Barnes seemed to ease their way off the front to a lead of 200metres. They remained in the lead for another 10minutes when they were joined by six other riders who stayed out front for the remainder of the race. Merv Byfield and Jaimie Kirkwood attacked again with three laps to go and managed to gain a 50metre lead. Magnus Rudisele tried an attack in the final two laps but was brought to heel by the rest of the bunch, leaving the contest for first place to Merv and Jaimie. It was Merv who triumphed, with third place going to Paul Burke who finished a length or so ahead of Magnus, while Ian Turner, John Clark, Matt Saliacus and Glenn French of the breakaway group finished some 50 metres ahead of the chasing bunch that was led in by Ian McFall.

26 February – Criteriums, Wangara

A cool and breezy morning but with the wind blowing on backs the speed up the rise to the finish was most impressive. A grand total of 92 starters despite there being competition from CA who were running their Criterium Championships affected 'A' grade more than other grades, the group being whittled to 19 riders, a dozen fewer than in the previous race. Not that this quietened the action that was started with an attack by Paul Foxwell on lap 2. Jason Rolfe went off the front for a brief sojourn a lap or so later and a serious looking break of four containing Peter Shanley, Marty Van Moorsel, Keith Winch and Gary Wright

forced a lead of 150 metres just after the 20-minute mark. There was a change of guard over the next few laps, as Gary and Greg Stoyles got together, though Gary decided to drop back to the shelter of the bunch at the 35-minute mark, leaving Greg to valiantly plough on alone until absorbed at 40 minutes. With 10mins and a couple of laps to go it was the turn of Neil Hastings who opened up a lead for two laps, only to be caught as the bunch crossed the line for the bell. In the sprint, two figures, Paul Foxwell and Gary Wright separated themselves from the bunch to fight for first place, Paul reversed their encounter on 5 February when he crossed half-a-length ahead, and some 10 metres in front of 3rd placed Ian O'Brien. Tim Mollison and Tony Mott continued their recent good form in 4th and 5th, while Marty Van Moorsell returned to the fold when he took the final cash prize.

'B' grade with 30 competitors saw a fast and furious race, although early attacks by Paul Lamond, Ian Turner and Paul Burke only managed to open up small gaps. Matt Saliacus took a flyer with three laps to go that saw him move to a useful looking lead of about 200metres, but he was caught before the next lap when Paul Burke and Matthew Owen moving as a duo caused the bunch to react. There was panic in the field as they entered the final corner at high speed for Sean Crummey's tyre could be heard exploding from the finish line, but apart from disrupting the plans of a few would-be sprinters, no-one came down. Matt Davis took the sprint finish in impressive style, with Nick Smith second, and Glenn French coming back to form after his lay-off finishing a close third. The familiar faces of Ian McFall, John Liso and Lee Potthast were next in line in the closely packed finishing bunch.

The 16 riders in 'C' grade were in aggressive form, though despite hard work at the front by Mike Watson, Scott Martin and Alison Dyson no-one could open up a gap of more than 30metres. The sprint proved an easy win for Anthony Fitzgerald who eased up with 20 metres to go to win by 10metres. This performance, along with his win the previous week, marked him as a definite promotion candidate to 'B' grade.

The 18 riders in 'C' grade rode hard with fast turns at the front by Doug Macdonald, Adam Scott and Martin Van Voorthuizen being noted by the masses at the start/finish line. With no-one strong enough to get away, it was again a familiar scene at the finish as the sprinters blasted away with 250metres to go. Winner for the second week running, and like Anthony Fitzgerald in 'C', a man destined for elevation to the next grade, was Doug Macdonald who opened up a gap of a couple of metres over regular prize-winners Bob Stephens and Jon Dooner. Martin Van Voorthuizen again featured when finishing 4th, while Adam Scott appearing for the first time this season impressed with his 5th place. Following his fall the previous week at Kewdale, Dai Sankey called it a day halfway through the race – his last event in WA for this season, as he prepared to fly back to the chill of the Welsh hills.

'E' grade's race was invigorated by the appearance of Susie Anderson, who along with Heather Sanderson stirred up action in the opening laps. This caused a split that also involved Roy Swift, Andrew Lorrimar and Derek Myall, though Roy was caught out halfway through the race when a small gap opened that he was unable to bridge. Although Derek looked as if he was struggling for a few laps he managed to garner sufficient strength to put in an effort over the final 40 metres that took him to the head of affairs. Heather Sanderson finished strongly a couple of lengths behind, while Susie Anderson took 3rd place on her wheel. Andrew Lorrimar of the original break finished a few metres behind.

100 riders – and 101 if we include Mark Leaker who forgot his shoes and ended up as a DNS! A pleasant start, though the sun showed some bite towards the end of the day's proceedings, and there was a fairly hard crosswind.

'E' grade was first off the block with the group remaining together for the duration of the race, though Laurie Mucciarone found it hard going in only his third race but showed

improvement over his earlier rides. Stick in there Laurie and you'll soon be sitting on your compatriots wheels. The final drive up the finishing straight saw some challenging riding, the verdict going to Roy Swift over Helen Peniston, with Jack Iveson a close third.

Rob Brand and Wayne Gordon rode with fire in their belly's early in 'D' grade's race when opening a gap of 200metres that they held for a couple of laps. Adam Scott was also active two-thirds of the way through the race but while chased down he still had the energy to finish third in a fast finish in which Jeff Gleadow and Paul Greeney were 1st and 2nd. Craig Hynes led in the remainder while John Flynn was fifth alongside the improving Bevan Buirchall.

Not too long ago, 'C' grade would have plodded along until the final sprint was contested but as with all our grades times are getting faster. An average of 39.9kph illustrates the improvement. Biggest shout of the day was for Doug MacDonald who despite being promoted from 'D' was actually seen opening up a gap on the chasing bunch when halfway through the race. He also finished 6th overall, though with two trial riders in the frame he took the money-prize for fourth placing. The winner was ex British Professional road and criterium champion Phil Thomas (he actually won the Kellogs series round of city-centre criteriums in Britain many years ago when Phil Anderson finished 2nd overall). Phil spent a season or two in WA over 20 years ago when he won numerous races. Despite limited training he showed his class by beating our ace sprinter Mick Russell across the line by a quarter of a wheel, As Phil was on a trial ride, Mick was pleased to be promoted to first place, especially as the huge purse of money was helping pay his trip to Melbourne. David Ellis, another trial rider crossed the line in 4th place while Wayne Allen was next in line. (If all this is confusing – see the results below!).

'B' grade saw a lively event as Ian Turner burned up the tarmac to take a lead of over 100metres after only 10 minutes of riding. A lap later he had been brought to

heel but that saw another attack when Anthony Bourn and Jaimie Kirkwood rode off the front of the 23-strong bunch. The 22minute mark realized the move of the day, when a number of riders bolted up the road to consolidate into a strong working group of five – Carl Skinner, Jaimie Kirkwood, Ian McFall, Justin McGoldrick and Magnus Rudisele. They steadily built up a lead of half-a-lap over the field, to finish in that order. The bunch sprint for 6th place was easily taken by Bruce McLennan who led in Stephen Farran by some 10 metres.

As expected, ‘A’ grade witnessed the most attacking riding of the day. Inspiring was the riding of Bob Addy who at 71 years of age attacked the field on the first lap to open up a gap of 250 metres, this being only the first of his attempts during the course of the race. Thereafter there were numerous breakaways, Scott Ayles and Paul Lamond being early animators, while George Miller, Neil Hastings and Wayne Thomson also tried their luck. Later attacks also featured Ian Gregory who with four laps to go found himself with a 300metre advantage. The bunch was, however, vigilant and despite a last lap attack by Scott Ayles who was 50metres to the good as he passed the bell, all came together for a mass sprint up the straight. Doug Stewart looked a clear leader with forty metres to go and he crossed the line first. However, the eagle-eyed referee noted Doug drift to the right thus checking the progress of Wayne Thomson and Gary Wright, with the result that he was relegated to third position, while Wayne was given a surprise birthday present! Wayde Keyser led in the bunch that was some 20metres behind, while Jason Puls, Richard Kelly and Tim Mollison finished 5th, 6th and 7th respectively out of the field of 29 riders.

There were a large number of ‘promotions’ on the day, and it was good to note that all those privileged to move up a grade made good account of themselves. Bruce Abbott was welcomed back to racing following his accident at the end of the last road season, though he found it hard going, and Clint Bird after four years in Hong Kong found that starting back is a painful process.

18 March – Criteriums, Kewdale

A beautiful day, clear blue skies, a very light breeze and 92 riders, despite the attraction of the mass Freeway ride in the City. Being the last event to count for points there was a degree of anticipation though the two forerunners for the main award both failed to feature in the placings – Doug Stewart finishing an uncharacteristic 19th in ‘A’ and Bob Stephens having an unfortunate fall in ‘C’.

The premier grade with 24 riders was witness to the usual fast and furious riding, with attacks coming off the front from the finish of the count-down. The move of the day came after 15 minutes when Troy Coulthard moved off the front of the bunch to hold a lead of no more than 50metres for the next two laps. He was then joined by Matt Tognini, Greg McCoy, Cameron Berg, Neil Hastings, Ian Lyne and Chris Peniston who worked together to build up an increasing lead for the next 20 minutes. At that juncture Ian Lyne and Chris Peniston were shed to chase in no-mans land for the remainder of the race, leaving the five survivors to keep up the pressure. The leaders actually caught the chasing bunch as they sprinted for the line but thankfully the bunch kept to the left to allow them to contest unhindered. The victor in impressive style was Troy Coulthard who beat ‘ever so humble’ Matt Tognini by a clear three or four lengths, followed closely by Greg McCoy, Cameron Berg and Neil Hastings. Ian Lyne and Chris Peniston managed to hang on to their advantage, and Pedro Turibaka led in the rest of the field.

Trial rider Lorenzo Mascaro livened up ‘B’ grade with an attack that saw him establish a 50metre lead at the 35-minute mark, though as with previous attacks this was nullified by the attentive bunch that remained intact to the bell lap. This, along with a tight grouping to the right of the road as they left the final corner for the sprint was, however, a recipe for disaster, and with little room to manoeuvre the almost inevitable happened as a couple of riders touched wheels. Fortunately, the injuries that affected Peter Hammond and John Buonvecchi proved to be minor, though the incident messed up the sprint for a number of hopefuls. Those in front of the accident were able to proceed unhindered, with the laurels

going to Charlie Gargett who finished just ahead of Magnus Rudisele, Ian McFall, trial rider Rob Michetti, Carl Skinner and Reg Edwards.

Triathlon champion and ex Institute of Sport rider Emma Gillard joined ‘C’ grade in her first cycling road criterium ever and managed to finish eighth in a fast moving race. No epics were recorded and the bunch stayed close together until an unfortunate pile-up occurred on the 2nd to last bend when a few riders went down. Among these were Geoff Gilmore and Bob Stephens, who, as previously mentioned was hoping to cap his series points-score with a win. Again, there were no broken bones, just a few sore hips and bloodied knees and elbows that following the ‘B’ grade accident saw our stock of bandages disappear as Fran Watson liberally dispensed her largesse on the injured! Back to the race, and there was still a large group to contest the finish with victory going to the man who has been knocking on the door of success for many weeks, Peter Neuzerling. Alison Dyson showed her improved sprinting ability and form when finishing second, to be followed home by Steve Ryan, Mick Russell, Enzo Cadelli and Ray Bergin. In finishing fourth, Mick repeated his placing in an open handicap in Victoria the previous week when he was up against 160 other competitors. Congratulations Mick in upholding the dignity of the club in foreign parts!

Fortunately ‘D’ grade proved a calmer race than some of the others on the day, there being no falls or incidents. Although run at a fast pace (and its notable that all our grades are moving faster than ever) the bunch remained together until the run up the finishing straight. This saw Jeff Gleadow prove his sprinting ability by repeating his previous week’s win against some serious competitors, including Rob Brand and Martin Van Voorthuizen who finished 2nd and 3rd respectively. Adam Scott was again in the cash prizes while Wayne Gordon and Leon Nieuwenhuizen were just outside.

‘E’ grade wound up their points score competition with some fast and attacking riding that saw a couple of riders, including

eventually placed Jack Iveson struggling at times off the back of the field. Laurie Muccarione again rode a lonely race but showed improvement over his previous three rides being encouraged along by the gathered masses. In the sprint there was no surprise to see Roy Swift sweep to the front with 150 metres to go, though Helen Peniston put on an impressive show as she chased him down to finish a couple of lengths behind. Jack Iveson was next across the line while Des Williams showed improved form over the previous couple of rides when beating Derek Mayall across the line.
